I am glad to be here today to formalise the partnership between Singapore Red Cross and Singapore Polytechnic School of Architecture & The Built Environment.

For SRC, the MOU marks a significant milestone in our efforts to raise awareness of humanitarian issues and challenges, especially amongst the youth. The Diploma-Plus Certificate Programme in Humanitarian Affairs officially commences today, and I am heartened to learn that the course has attracted the interest of more than 120 students.
